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


Brown's Mill Park: Background Research




Brown's Mill Park is a neighborhood in south Atlanta

- Located northeast of Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta Airport
- Home to the Browns Mill Golf Course
- ~ 20-minute drive from Georgia Tech (~ 9 miles south)






Browns Mill Park reflects the high segregation levels and concentrations of poverty of Atlanta









The neighborhood developed out of a dairy farm

- Browns Mill Golf Course built in 1969 on previous dairy farmland. Designed by George Cobb
- The diary farmed belonged to I.T. Davis
 (founder of a Georgia co-op that became
 Atlanta Dairies)
- Sitting right outside Browns Mill Park, 2672
 Browns Mill Road is a house built in 1920,
 designed by A. Ten Eyck Brown
- Browns Mill Park was developed post-World War II, in the 1950s and 60s, featuring modest brick ranch and wooden frame homes

Browns Mill Park has some beneficial community resources

- Browns Mill Golf Course serves as both a recreational and economic asset
- Urban Forrest Community
 Development helps to beautify the neighborhood and combat local hunger
- Public Transportation Options
- A Local Library





Browns Mill Golf Course is an asset that offers recreational options for people in the community

- A public 18-hole golf course designed by George Cobbs which opened in the 1970s
- Contains three tees so visitors at all skill levels can enjoy the course
- Open seven days a week from Dusk to Dawn, and a minimum age of play is seven
- Currently it cost 19.25 dollars to reverse a time to play and there's different monthly passes available with various benefits





Urban Forest Community is an asset that helps combat the neighborhood's food desert

- Established in Browns Mill which is an identified food forest on the cite that was previously a farm owned by Ruby and Millie Morgan.
- The goal of the community is to produce a variety of food opens open for public consumption
- There's currently a three-phase conceptual model in place that includes areas focused on local wildlife, medicinal food and mushrooms, recreational areas, and edible food.





The neighborhood faces substantial deficits as well

- There's a lack of high rated public schools with rating of local charters and academies in the 4-5 star range
- Browns Mill Park also resides within a food desert.
- Lack Of Recreational Activities and Youth Centers
- Not a lot of commercial development






Browns Mill Park's very low economic mobility score reflects overall neighborhood deficits

Browns Mill Park scores a **38.4/100** on the Atlanta Economic Mobility Index Score:

This statistic highlights the deficits of the area very well:

- People-based index: 36.8
- Place-based index: 41.3
- Economic system index: 39.0
- Education system index: 35.5






Brown Mills Park experiences relatively high crime for Atlanta

There is a **91.5** crime rate* in the neighborhood's area

Crime breaks down into 3 categories (last 3 years):

- Against Person (170, mainly assault)
- Against Property (276, diverse)
- Against Society (174, almost entirely drugrelated)

This is **high for Atlanta**, but **far below other neighborhoods**, like Bankhead/Washington Park (**225**) or even Downtown (**150**).





Crime does exist, and Cleveland Avenue is a high crime area



There is generally a lot of crime reported around Cleveland Avenue



Most of Browns Mill Park's crimes against society, almost entirely drug charges, are along Cleveland Avenue




Poor news coverage contributes to risk perception

There are **few news stories** about the neighborhood, and many are **crime-centered**.

Searching "Browns Mill Park' Atlanta" on the Google News tab, only **10 results appear:**

- 3/10 cover crime
- 4/10 cover the food forest/food insecurity
- 3/10 cover the metro Atlanta area generally

Coverage presents the area as disadvantaged.





However, crime is falling dramatically in the area




Browns Mill Park's location provides some healthcare access

Via I-75, Browns Mill Park is within 20 min of Grady with average traffic

There are various clinics in the area, including the **Urban Clinic of Atlanta**, which provides **free service**

In terms of at-home treatment, there are also options:

 ~5 min drive/35 min walk to a Walgreens





Despite high availability, there are still poor outcomes

There is very **low life expectancy** in the Browns Mill Park census tract, when compared to **Fulton County**, and **Georgia** as a whole.

In terms of health coverage:

- 27% of adult residents lack coverage, ~1207 people
- 12% of under 18 residents lack coverage, ~168 people




Concerningly: 45% of employed adults lack any healthcare coverage



Residents of Browns Mill Park face housing issues

As of 2018 there are **4,740** people living in the **Brown Mills Park Zone**

- 66% of residents are rentburdened
- 414 buildings are vacant





Housing trends have changed overtime at Browns Mill Park

- Currently, Browns Mill park is experiencing downward housing trends compared to last year (2023)
 - Home prices down 15% with a median of 240k
 - Houses are also selling slower when compared to last year (down 30% year to year)
 - Furthermore, typically homes have been on the market for more days, and are selling on average 3% below list price







Browns Mill Park lacks proper walking and biking

infrastructure

 Browns Mill Park received a walk score of just 25 according to WalkScore.

- In addition, they received a score of 42 for biking.
- Most of Browns Mill Park contains sidewalks, which are relatively small, ideally for one way traffic.
- Some areas lack sidewalks altogether, making walking difficult and dangerous for pedestrians
- Brown's Mill Park contains shared lanes, which can be dangerous for cyclist and frustrating for drivers









Two routes in the neighborhood provide public transit

- Two MARTA bus routes run through Browns Mill Park
- Route 78 (Cleveland Avenue) and Route 178 (Empire Blvd/Southside Ind Park)
- These two routes allow for residents to move around the South Atlanta area connecting to other routes
- The transit score according to WalkScore was 40
- In 2022, 5% of residents in Browns Mill Park made use of public transportation to get to work, which results in 72 residents.







I-75 is both a major transportation artery and block


The highway provides access to Atlanta services of many kinds, such as the previously mentioned healthcare facilities


However, due to its size, it blocks off a whole side of the neighborhood, even cutting through previously existing roads





Residents rely heavily on vehicles to get to work








Brown's Mill Park residents face economic inequity

- Atlanta (2018-2022)






The percentage of the area that is **Low-Income** has increased from **43.6%** in 2010 to **70.3%** in 2018



Cleveland Avenue Elementary School is a statistically underperforming school

- Cleveland Avenue Elementary ranks below standard in multiple area
- Student demographic is almost completely minority children from low-income households (92% Black and 7% Hispanic and 100% on free or reduced lunch)
- These Students are consistently performing below city and state averages on standardized tests








Browns Mill Park has multiple options for early child care development

 is described to have adequate early
 learning access
- There are three early learning centers near Browns Mill Park
 - o Ms. Niecy's Early Learning Center
 - Gift of Love Learning Center
 - Adventist-Maranatha Early Learning
- Ms. Niecy's is the highest rated center and offers a multitude of programs and classes for children 0-12








Browns Mill Park has unique issues and opportunities

- What can be done to increase school performance?






Most of this part of Cleveland Avenue is underdeveloped

There are **very few businesses** along the road once you cross Hapeville into Browns Mill Park

- Most are small, with large parking lots and small individual businesses
- Some properties are underdeveloped or blighted

There are also wooded areas allowing for **new development and expansion**.



Main Streets are lively and accessible

A 'main street' style road has many benefits

- Promote walking
- Businesses are closer together
- Human-scale neighborhood

Streetside parking would till be available

- Provides more accessibility for the movement impaired
- Allows out-of-neighborhood visits to the community





Main streets empower healthy lifestyles

Better walking and bike infrastructure

- Biking is a good form of exercise and recreation
- Increases the presence of people on the street and the liveliness of an area
 - Instead of people simply getting into their car to drive every where

This would also fit into a network of outdoor areas and activities





Main Streets can support higher densities

Brown's Mill lacks density especially on the main street corridor

- Has many deep lots that can be repurposed to support multifamily units and ground level retail
- This would help to increase density along Cleveland Ave and put eyes on the main street

Multipurpose zoning and high density could create new opportunities for businesses and housing, attracting people to the area







Bike trails along Cleveland Avenue, Golf Course, and Swann Nature Preserve

Bike trails would better connect all of Browns Mill Park

- Promote engagement in outdoor activity like biking but also walking and hiking through the preserve
- Reduce the congestion of traffic and allow for better flow along Cleveland Avenue
- Provide alternative options for mobility and cleaner transportation





Browns Mill Park should invite Carver Neighborhood Market to the local food desert

- Bringing the Carver Neighborhood market to Browns Mill Park will help give the residents better and healthier food options to buy
- Allows access to fresh produce and a designated grocery store, not a food mart
- Carver could help to address the issues of the food desert status as it will serve as the main location where residents can purchase food.
- In addition, its economic impact would help the neighborhood
- It would bring around 11-50 jobs to the market





Establishing a Neighborhood Clinic will be beneficial to the neighborhood's health

- Bringing a neighborhood clinic to Browns Mill Park would help to increase the health outcomes of residents
- Allowing for access to close and quality healthcare services would help residents receive and seek the care they need without having to travel miles outside of their residence
- Bringing a Piedmont Urgent Care or Piedmont Physicians could help to allow residents to visit a doctor and reduce transport outside of Browns Mill Park
- Currently Browns Mill Parks closest healthcare sits across the highway





There are multiple attractors Browns Mill Park can leverage to foster community growth and student excellence

- Afterschool Programs are attractors we can implement to improve the environment at Cleveland Avenue
- Partnerships with Local non-profits can help build community and offer students a productive way to spent their time
- Bike trails connecting educational, residential, and recreational spaces can help build connectivity and a better sense of community





Partnering with a local non-profit can increase academic achievement and built community bonds

- Atlanta Music Project is a local non-profit that offers after-school programs for elementary school aged kids.
- They offer chorus, orchestra and band ensembles for students while providing a scholarship on all music related items
- Learning to read music or play an instrument has been linked to numerous benefits like increases social skills, memory, and pattern recognition





Expanding the Urban Food Forest will increase community engagement and public perception

- The Urban Food Forest is an attractor for good press in the neighborhood that we can leverage
- Partnering with the local school can build trust with the community and help students conceptualize topics like biology and environmental science
- Having the Urban Food Forest also host significant recreational space like benches or picnic areas can increase community engagement





Promoting community use of Browns Mill Golf Course can be beneficial for the neighborhood and its inhabitants

- Making sure the golf course is integrated with the proposed bike trails will make travel easier and incentivize community engagement
- Establishing a **children's association** at the Golf Course can provide a healthy partnership with the local school
- Establishing a neighborhood pass that discounts prices for residents can further incentivize community engagement
- Playing golf is associated with multiple benefits that can help build skills like, endurance, patience, self-control, and concentration
